2	Right of reproduction and safeguarding copies	As to the topic of the right of reproduction and safeguarding copies, concern was expressed regarding the scope of the concepts under consideration and the possible overlap with other topics. Suggestions were made to modify the title of the topic. The Committee considered that arrangements such as limitations and exceptions for libraries and archives, among others, play an important role in allowing the reproduction of works for certain purposes, including research.
